## **Letter from Garden Organic**

Dear Garden Organic volunteers,

You may have seen in our latest e-newsletter, that we are part of a campaign led by the Butterfly Conservation Trust, asking UK retailers to end the sale of synthetic pesticides for unlicensed use.

The Big Butterfly Count has taken place for 15 years, and in that time more than twice as many widespread species have declined significantly than have increased. Despite this year's excellent weather for butterflies, only average numbers were recorded. This is why we are calling on supermarkets and garden centres to end the sale of synthetic pesticides, which harm butterflies.

## Also from Garden Organic

To mark the <u>Heritage Seed Library's</u> (HSL) half century of seed saving, we're launching a unique 'seed relay', in October, which will see precious heritage vegetable seeds shared, sown and saved across the country.

The relay will have three parts: in England in 2025, Scotland and Wales in 2026, and a special celebration will take place in Ireland. The first leg of the Seed Relay will start from Bocking, Essex, where the seed of the HSL was first sown, and where Garden Organic founder Lawrence D Hills began his groundbreaking organic gardening and conservation work.

During the giant 50th birthday 'pass-the-parcel' event, the precious heritage seeds will travel more than 200 miles to be shared among key individuals, organisations and communities across England, before finishing at Garden Organic.

At each stop-off point, supporting 'seed champions' will take a packet of seed from the golden anniversary parcel to grow (and eventually harvest and save), and pass the rest of the seeds onto the next destination.

The group of COGF members who visited Ryton in August saw the good work that was being done there at the seed library. Members of the Heritage Seed Library can request six varieties of seed completely free every year. Membership costs £21.

Here are of the benefits of growing Heritage Seed Library seed:

- support the conservation of rare vegetable varieties for future generations;
- get your hands on exclusive veg varieties not available anywhere else;
- increase biodiversity in your garden;
- save your own seeds from one generation to the next;
- help to maintain genetic diversity within vegetable crops, which may be useful to the plant breeders of the future.

## **British Hedgehog Preservation Society**

## Hedgehogs in farms/gardens

### Hazards:

Garden ponds can be death traps to small mammals. Always ensure that there are several gently sloping slipways around the edge of the water to allow animals to escape if they fall in.

Cattle grids can also make for difficulties, as small animals including hedgehogs cannot escape from the sheer-sided pits beneath. The result could be a horrible and long drawn out death by dehydration and/or starvation. A small ramp or slope in one corner of the pit enables the trapped animals to walk out.

Ramps (150 - 200 mm wide) can be made of concrete, wood or metal, should not have a smooth surface and should have a slope not exceeding 1:2. The pit should be adequately drained. If it is impossible for an animal to gain access to the whole of the pit i.e. if it is sectionalised, more ramps would be required.

For further details refer to British Standards Institution (2006) BS 4008:2006 Specification for cattle grids. London: BSI.

### **Caring for Autumn Juveniles:**

Hedgehogs sometimes give birth to their hoglets late in the year. Such youngsters may not have enough time to build up sufficient fat reserves to enable them to survive hibernation. The absolute minimum weight to see them through the winter is 450gms (1lb) and any hedgehog below this weight is likely to have problems if it tries to hibernate.

Autumn juveniles, (i.e. youngsters found alone and under 450gms (1lb) after the end of September) will need extra help, even if it's just additional feeding in the garden. Hedgehogs found under 450gms (1lb) after the end of October will need to go to an independent hedgehog rescue to be overwintered. Once in care, hedgehog rehabilitators prefer to get autumn juveniles up to an optimum weight of 600gms (1lb 6oz) or more before considering release, because they will lose weight initially upon re-introduction to the wild.

If you find a hedgehog under 450gms (1lb) after the end of October, it will need help. For First Aid the hedgehog should be given extra warmth, either a warm hot water bottle wrapped in towelling or blanket or placed on a heated pad with room to get away from the heat should it get too warm. It should be placed in a box lined with torn newspaper or clean towelling or fleece for bedding.

If for some reason they cannot be brought indoors for immediate first aid, outbuildings would be acceptable if heated and flies can't get to the hedgehog, but don't put the box directly onto a metal grid or wire floor, or straight onto concrete – hedgehogs have sensitive feet and the cold will permeate through. Offer meaty hedgehog food, meaty cat or dog food or cat biscuits and fresh water. NEVER COW'S MILK.

As with all hedgehog casualties this is a specialised job, and the hedgehog(s) should be passed onto an experienced rehabilitator as soon as possible. Call BHPS on 01584 890801 for details of your nearest independent rescue.

### Hibernation:

If you want to attract wildlife to your garden, ensure there is easy access for them, leave wild areas and avoid 'tidying up' too much. Hedgehogs tend to hibernate between November and mid-March and may choose the stack of leaves or branches in your garden that you have built as a bonfire pile. For this reason if you have to get rid of such material, move it to a different spot immediately before setting fire to it; a hedgehog may be sheltering or hibernating in it. Light from one side only to allow an escape route for anything you have missed. They like to nest under things (e.g. sheds, hedges and brushwood) and need plenty of dry leaves to build their nest.

## **Directions to Braithwaite Village Hall**

Braithwaite Village Hall is not in Braithwaite village. The hall is on the north side of the A66 while Braithwaite village is on the south side.

Approaching along the A66 from the Penrith or Keswick direction you should note two turnings left: the first signposted Braithwaite and the second about 300 yards further on signposted Thornthwaite. The entrance to the village hall car park is on the right about 50 yards after this second turning left.

Approaching along the A66 from the Cockermouth direction you should note two turnings right signposted Thornthwaite which are spaced almost 2 miles apart. The entrance to the village hall car park is on the left about 200 yards after the second turning right signposted Thornthwaite. The car park entrance is after a signpost for a third turning right to Thornthwaite but before the turning right itself and just after you pass the village hall on the left.

## Recipe

### **Sweet Potato and Leek Pancakes**



Makes four

### Ingredients

Two medium sized sweet potatoes 4 medium sized leeks cheese for grating

### Cheese sauce

50g (2 oz) butter 40g (1.5 oz) flour 425ml (15fl oz) milk 75 ml (2.5 fl oz) cream 40g (1.5 oz) cheese salt pepper

### Pancake mix

55g (2 oz) plain flour 1 egg pinch of salt 100mls (3.5 fl oz) milk 35mls (1.5 fl oz) water

### Method

Make up the cheese sauce and the pancake batter. Peel and dice the sweet potatoes and gently fry. Chop the leeks and fry them, then add both to the cheese sauce, retaining some of the sauce to spread on top of the pancakes.

Make up four pancakes and share the filling between them.

Place in an ovenproof dish. Spread remaining sauce over pancakes and sprinkle with grated cheese. Place in a preheated oven (180°/350°/gas 4) for 20 minutes to heat through.
